These events, along with the creation of a new position of Community Economic Development Coordinator in the organization for the 2022-2023 fiscal year, brought many and exciting organizational changes to our organization. loan compliance audit and embracing our theme of change, the staff completed an internal review of our annual loan reviews process and implemented it by fiscal year end in March.

Community Futures West Yellowhead, along with the CFs in the province, created a new website with updated branding and marketing in 2021. This new website is another accomplishment that allows us to be more focused in our marketing and branding in the region and allows us greater accessibility to the West Yellowhead region and new and existing clients.

Community Futures West Yellowhead completed two Rural Opportunities Fund projects in 2021-2022 entitled "Economic Diversification and Energy Transition in the West Yellowhead" and "Supporting Local on the Road to Recovery: #choosewestyellowhead." These projects are summarized in this report and were an opportunity for CFWY to access community economic development dollars for our region.

During the pandemic, CFWY staff and board realized we needed to be more strategic in meeting the need of our business clients. In the fall of 2021 and the spring of 2022, business visitation surveys were completed by CFWY staff throughout the West Yellowhead region. The Fall 2021 business visitation focused on active storefront locations in Jasper, Grande Cache, Hinton, Edson, Niton Junction, Wildwood, Peers, Evansburg and Carrot Creek and focused on strategic conversations based on energy consumption and possible energy savings opportunities for businesses, training needs, and other CFWY programming opportunities. Due to the federal and municipal election, staff chose to conduct the fall visits without chamber volunteers, board members or local politicians. However, by spring 2022, all these groups were included, and we were able to include all our municipalities, local chambers, MLA and MP in our business visitations with a total of 20 volunteers allowing us to visit more businesses and have conversations about our role in supporting businesses in the pandemic.
